His formative years were spent at Gibbs Senior High School, where his athletic prowess shone brightly. Excelling in basketball, football, and track, Elbert was a key player on two State Championship basketball teams. His remarkable skills earned him distinctions as All-City, All-County, All-State, and an honorable mention All-American.

Following high school, Elbert continued his athletic journey at Texas Southern University, where he played collegiate football. After completing his studies, he returned to Pinellas County, dedicating himself to a career in education. As a member of the original staff at Osceola High School, he made a lasting impact by establishing the boys' basketball program, where he served as head coach for an impressive 25 years.

In retirement, Elbert cherishes spending time with his family, which includes two beloved grandchildren. He also devotes time to his lifelong passion for fishing, finding joy and tranquility in the waters of Florida's beautiful landscapes. His life's journey is a testament to dedication, community service, and the enduring bonds of family and tradition.



Oscar Davenport, a distinguished multi-sport athlete from St. Petersburg, Florida, is celebrated for his exceptional skill, leadership, and versatility. At Osceola High School, Davenport excelled as a quarterback while also making significant achievements in basketball and track and field. His leadership on the court led his team to victory in the Suncoast AAU Boys Basketball Tournament, where he earned MVP honors in the 17-and-under AAU State Tournament in Cocoa Beach. As a track and field competitor, he broke his high school's record in the triple jump, showcasing his remarkable

athletic range. His accomplishments earned him recognition as Athlete of the Year for Pinellas and Hillsborough counties in both 1993 and 1994, cementing his status as one of the region's premier athletes.


Davenport's prowess in football secured him a scholarship to the University of North Carolina, where he played quarterback for the Tar Heels from 1995 to 1998. Renowned for his precision, poise, and consistency, Davenport set a UNC record with a 59.9% career completion rate and achieved 154 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Over his collegiate career, he amassed 3,090 passing yards, 18 touchdowns, and only eight interceptions. A standout moment came in the 1997 Gator Bowl, where Davenport earned MVP honors by leading the Tar Heels to a 20-13 victory over West Virginia, helping UNC secure a Top 10 national ranking.

Following his college career, Davenport played professionally for the Carolina Rhinos in the Arena Football League, continuing to demonstrate his athletic prowess and passion for the sport.

Beyond his playing career, Davenport transitioned into coaching, where he has made a lasting impact mentoring young athletes. Currently serving as the Offensive Coordinator at Lassiter Middle School in Marietta, Georgia, he has guided the team to multiple championships and elevated their competitive standing over the last three years. During the off-season, Davenport coaches in the 7-on-7 passing league, helping middle school, high school, and preparatory students refine their skills, build confidence, and unlock their potential. His commitment to mentorship and development has earned him the respect of his peers and the admiration of his players.

In addition to his contributions to sports, Davenport has worked full-time as an electrician for Fulton County for over a decade, showcasing his dedication and work ethic.

A devoted family man, Davenport is the proud father of two adult daughters and the grandfather of two grandsons, who bring him immense joy and pride. His enduring legacy as an athlete, coach, and mentor continues to inspire success both on and off the field.



Haydyn Gibson, a Clearwater, Florida native, discovered her passion for golf in first grade. She honed her skills at Osceola Fundamental High School, where she was a standout member of the women's golf team. In 2014, Haydyn achieved a remarkable milestone by winning the high school state championship—a victory she dedicated to her late friend and classmate, Devin Chester, who had tragically passed away just a week earlier.

After high school, Haydyn joined the women's golf team at Tulane University, where she competed at the collegiate level. She graduated in 2020 with a degree in Sociology, balancing her academic and athletic commitments while actively engaging with the Tulane and New Orleans communities through various committees and organizations.

Haydyn's leadership and dedication led her to a prestigious NCAA Division II Governance internship in Indianapolis in June 2020. Since then, she has advanced her career within the NCAA, contributing to Division II Governance, supporting NCAA President Charlie Baker in Executive Affairs, and most recently, joining the Division I Governance team.

Golf remains a central part of Haydyn's life, both professionally and personally. She recently got engaged to her fiancé, Ian, on their home golf course—a testament to her enduring love for the sport. Joe Sleppy graduated from Osceola High School in 2014, where he immersed himself in a variety of activities, including baseball, lacrosse, track, AP classes, and honor societies. He was a captain of the swim team, an editor of the 2014 yearbook, and even attempted to build a perpetual energy machine in Ms. Ferguson's classroom during lunch breaks using paint sticks, magnets, and electromotive force from Home Depot materials. Among his high school achievements, Joe considers founding his first business, SleppSolutions, to be his most defining experience. After winning the Pinellas County Next Generation Entrepreneurs competition, he launched the company, which developed handsfree fitness equipment for amputees and partnered with MacDill Air Force Base to support wounded veterans. Joe went on to study electrical engineering at the University of Central Florida (UCF). In 2016, he cofounded Capacitech Energy to license and commercialize technologies developed in the lab where he was working. Over the years, he raised \$2.5 million in funding for Capacitech through investments and federal grants from the National Science Foundation. His entrepreneurial spirit earned him several accolades, including a one-onone meeting with Bill Gates as a representative of UCF, the "Young Entrepreneurship Award" presented by former Governor Rick Scott, a spot on the Orlando Business Journal's Fire Awards, andrecognition in UCF's 30 Under 30. Under his leadership, Capacitech was named one of the Top 30 energy storage startups in the world.

Today, Joe serves as the CEO of Capacitech Energy, addressing power quality challenges in the grid and renewable energy systems. He married his incredible wife, Hannah, in 2022, and credits her as a source of immeasurable love and gratitude. Beyond his professional achievements, Joe is dedicated to community service, supporting recovering addicts through ministry, and inspiring students by participating in programs and classes at UCF and local public schools.

While pursuing her nursing degree at UF, Jen married her best friend and stayed active in intramural sports, winning several championships. After graduation, she embarked on a dynamic career in healthcare, working in the NICU and pediatric operating room.
