Families often ask, “What can I do to help my child get ready for kindergarten?”

We’ve got you covered! Keep reading for tips and resources to prepare you for the first day of kindergarten.

It all Matters!

Being ready for kindergarten is about much more than the ABCs and 123s. We want to be sure we are helping children grow in all areas of their development. Consider the following:

Social and Emotional Development is critical to children’s success in kindergarten and includes things such as recognizing and managing feelings, taking turns and sharing, and using words to solve problems.

Physical Development impacts other areas of development. Activities include physical play, safety, nutrition, and personal care.

Approaches to Learning involves children’s attitudes and how they approach learning, such as persistence, curiosity, attention to tasks, planning, and creativity.

Language and Literacy development is a complex process that involves speaking and listening and emergent reading and writing. Children are participating in conversations, enjoying books more, asking questions, and naming letters and connecting them to sounds.

Mathematical Thinking helps children make sense of the world. It involves counting, putting quantities together and taking them apart, identifying patterns and shapes, and measuring.

Scientific Inquiry and Social Studies helps children explore and learn about the world around them.

Creative Expression Through the Arts provides opportunities for children to express ideas and feelings in different ways such as music, creative movement, play, and art.

Get Ready to Read

Reading a book together with your child is one of the most important activities you can do to prepare your child to succeed as a reader. Fill your story times with a variety of books. Reading books aloud to children stimulates their imagination and expands their understanding of the world around them. It helps them develop language, sharpen their listening skills, and begin to understand how books and print work.

Make reading part of family life by reading aloud to your child at least once a day at a regularly scheduled time. Don’t worry if your child wants to hear the same book over and over. While it might not be exciting for you, hearing the same book provides predictability and builds confidence in early readers.

Be consistent, be patient, and watch your child fall in love with books.

- Storyline Online features popular children’s books being read aloud by celebrated actors.
- Get Epic is a free online library. Children can choose one book each day.
- Unite for Literacy is a free digital library that includes mostly non-fiction titles. Knowledge is power! Explore topics your child is interested in.

Encouraging a Love of Reading: Tips for Reading Books Together

Whether you are snuggled up with a printed book or nestled together with a tablet to enjoy a digital book, try these tips:

- Let your child choose what book to read. Don’t worry if they want to hear the same book again.
- If you can, find a quiet spot, free from distractions like the TV.
- Sit close together. Encourage your child to help you hold the book or tablet and turn the pages.
- Look closely at the pictures together. They help your child understand the book.
- Talk with your child about the book. Ask questions. Make comments. Explore new vocabulary and give child-friendly definitions.
- If you are reading a digital book, stay with your child. Interact the same way you would with a printed book.
- Have fun! There’s no right (or wrong) way to enjoy a book!
