Rebekah Harkness was born on April 17, 1915, and was an American socialite. However, what makes her so special is the reputation she left behind in a Rhode Island home. Harkness was known for wanting to do everything bad. Growing up, she was very wealthy and was recognized for creating outbursts along society events with her friends. After finishing school, Harkness went on to marry three men in her lifetime before ending up as a widower left with a Rhode Island estate. Her late husband's passing only fueled Harkness as she went on to open up a ballet workshop, steal a neighbor's cat, etc. Sadly, Rebekah Harkness would go on to die of cancer on June 17, 1862. Despite this, what makes her life story so compelling is how her legacy is told in a Taylor Swift song. The singer lays out Harkness life in a 2020 song in which she writes from Harkness's Rhode Island home, comparing the relation between Harkness' public life and hers. # Drafting and School Remodel


