The student experience is strong at Seminole Elementary and in Pinellas County Schools! Many of our students have or will be attending performances by Class Acts presented at the Mahaffey Theater between now and the end of the school year. From the Mahaffey Theater website, "each trip to the Duke Energy Center for the Arts - Mahaffey Theater is designed to foster a passion for the arts, while being simultaneously linked to current Florida B.E.S.T. Standards. The Class Acts program provides FREE engaging and entertaining field trip opportunities for students to engage in topics about Science, Math, Literature, History, Art, and Friendship." Another student experience is specifically for our 5th graders who will have a unique opportunity of attending Enterprise Village at the Stavros Institute. This year they will attend this unforgettable trip on April 2nd. From the Pinellas County School's website, Enterprise Village, described as a "self-contained economic education program that provides a hands-on learning experience for students. Students spend time in their classroom studying economic education objectives that teach them about writing checks, using a debit card, keeping a checkbook register, applying for a job and working in a group. These educational objectives are put into action as the students spend one day at the village. The layout of Enterprise Village is similar to a shopping mall. During their business day, students work in one of the 20+ businesses, take 3 breaks, receive paychecks and have the opportunity to be consumers by making purchases in one of the business-sponsored storefronts." I attended this field trip when I was in 5th grade and I remember it distinctly and with admiration, all these years later. Building Reading Stamina By: Reading Rockets

Reading stamina is your child's ability to focus and read independently for a long period of time without being distracted or without distracting others. Having stamina or endurance, builds strength and can apply to many different areas, such as, exercise, painting, and reading. Here are some ways to help your child build their reading stamina.

1. Vary the way the reading is done

You can have your child read to themselves, read to someone (even a stuffed animal), or listen to a book. Some combination of the three should make up the reading time, especially for new or struggling readers.

2. Choose "just right" books

If your child is able to read alone, help them choose a book that they are able to read independently. Have them read the first page aloud to you and if they are able to read it making only 5 errors then it is a just right book. Avoid using books that are too difficult to read alone.

3. Set reasonable goals

Most toddlers and preschoolers find it difficult to sit for long periods of time even with the most engaging book. When beginning, limit book time to just a few minutes a day a session and work up from there. For kindergarteners, consider starting with 10-15 minutes each session and work up from there. First through second grade students should be reading for 30 minutes. Third grade through fifth grade students should be reading for 30 – 45 minutes a session.

4. Celebrate progress

Without getting too caught up on the number of minutes spent reading, celebrate the time your child spends reading. Have them share their favorite part of the story, schedule a visit to the library or share your child's progress with other family members.

Spending longer periods of time reading means fewer interruptions and more time reading what they love. As your child moves into higher grades, having reading stamina will help your child navigate longer texts and assignments.
