Dear Seminole Elementary Families,

Prior to the Winter Holidays, our students completed their F.A.S.T (Florida Assessment of Student Thinking). These assessments are given three times each year and is helpful for monitoring student academic progress and learning gains. Your child's classroom teacher sent home your child's F.A.S.T Parent prior to the Winter break. The FAST Parent reports also available in FOCUS under the Parent Portal. In addition to providing parents with information about their child's academic progress, the information from the FAST Assessments helps us identify students that would benefit from our before and after school tutor programs. Currently, over 40% of our students are taking advantage of the before and after school learning opportunities. We can't thank you enough for also emphasizing the importance of education and encouraging your children to do their best! What an impact it is making as we all work together and develop such successful students and great citizens. As always, I thank you for the opportunity to work with you and your children and am most appreciative of the support and interest in the Seminole Elementary School Community.

Reading

Having all of our students reading at or above grade level is a huge priority at Seminole Elementary. All the research supports the fact that students that are proficient readers are more successful in school. One of the best ways to improve reading skills is by reading daily. The expectation is for all students to read every night and complete their reading logs. After students read a book, they log into Accelerated Reader and take a computer-based quiz. Students earn points for scoring 80% or higher on the quizzes. Every student in grades 1-5 have an individual quarterly reading goal. Please ask your child to share their reading goal with you and their progress towards achieving their goal.



Guidance Corner from Mrs. Moore



As the Restorative Practices lead at Seminole Elementary, I attend periodic trainings throughout the school year. This past week at our training, we were reminded of the importance of using affective statements with our students. I have been amazed at their effectiveness as I employ them around campus.

One of my favorite examples is in the cafeteria during lunch duty. Last year, I covered kindergarten and first grade lunch, and found myself almost constantly reminding students of our RISE expectations like sitting on their bottoms or keeping their hands to themselves. I must have repeated these directives a hundred times only to say them again. It wasn't until I used an affective statement that students began to change their behavior. Instead of saying "sit on your bottom," over the microphone, I said something like "I feel worried when you don't sit on your bottom because you might fall and hurt yourself and that would make me feel sad. Would you consider sitting on your bottom so that you stay safe?" I could not believe the immediate change in behavior. All students were sitting on their bottoms!

In an excerpt from The Restorative Practices Playbook, it lists the 5 steps to affective statements as follows:

- 1. Give a short description of the problem behavior without assigning blame (I saw that you were on your knees while you were eating lunch).
- Share feelings you experienced because of the problem behavior (I felt worried when I saw that you weren't sitting on your bottoms).
- Name the tangible effects the action had on you (I'm concerned if you are on your knees, you might slip and fall or bump into another student and someone might get hurt).
- 4. Name what you value and need (It's important to me that we are all safe).
- 5. State the plan or request (Would you consider sitting on your bottoms so that everyone can enjoy a safe lunch together?)

I encourage you to try using affective statements with your students at home as we continue to use them here at Seminole Elementary to redirect and set up students to reach their full potential. Affective statements ask us all to examine how situations that arise during the day make us feel which is an important and useful life skill.



Some Important Things Your Child Needs to Know About Math

As a parent, you can help your child learn math by offering them insights into how to approach math. Your child will develop more confidence in their math ability if they understand the following:

- There are many different ways to solve a problem. Even though most math problems have only one answer, there may be many ways to get to that answer. Learning math is more than finding the precise answer, it is also the process of solving the problem and applying what they have learned to new problems.
- 2. Wrong answers can be useful to help your child figure out where or why they made a mistake. Analyzing the wrong answer can help your child understand the concepts and learn to apply reasoning skills to arrive at the correct answer. Ask your child to explain how they solved the problem. This may help you discover the areas your child needs extra help with.
- 3. Take a risk. Help your child become a risk taker by showing them the value of trying to solve a problem, even if it is difficult. Give your child extra time to explore different methods to solving a difficult problem. As your child works, encourage them to talk about what they are thinking. This strategy will help your child strengthen their math skills.
- 4. Doing math in your head (mental math) is important. Math is not restricted to paper and pencil. Mental math is a valuable skill that comes in handy as they make quick calculations of costs in stores, restaurants, or gas stations. Let your child know that using mental math will allow their math skills to become stronger.
- 5. It is OK to use a calculator to solve mathematical problems. Knowing how to use a calculator correctly when allowed to use them in class is important. Let your child know that to use a calculator correctly and most efficiently, they will need a strong foundation in math operations, otherwise how will they know whether the answer they get is a reasonable answer.
- These are some examples of how to provide your child with help in math.

Ask Questions

Assist students in preparation for starting tasks; ask "What do you need to be able to do this?"

Be Clear

Use multi-sensory approach with both visual an oral instructions – ask student to describe to you what the assignment is. Allow time for processing.

Be Positive

Stress effort and enjoyment for self, rather than competition with others.
