Application Period for 2022-2023: Jan. 5-14, 2021 Discovery Nights:

Acceptance Period for 2022-2023: Feb. 7-18, 2021

Who must apply: Any student who will be new to Bay Point Elementary, including incoming Kindergarten students. If you currently have a student who attends BPE, you do not need to reapply as they are grandfathered into the next grade level. If your child has a sibling that you would like to also attend BPE and they are not currently a student with us, you must complete the online application and then select the Sibling Priority Preference.

*Note: Priorities do not guarantee a student a seat, but do increase their chances; please be advised priorities only apply if you select us as your #1 choice.

Our Guidelines for Success


Restorative Practice Highlights

Be Responsible Be Respectful

- Students should not be running at any time on campus unless they are instructed to at PE
- They should check around themselves in the classroom and in the cafeteria and pick up any mess they have left behind
- If they cannot behave that way at home, they should not behave that way at school
- It is never okay to argue or yell at others
- They should have their listening ears on at all times
- If someone is regularly bothering them, tell an adult; adults can take care of it so students don't have to
- It is never okay to hit or push another student
- * Students are rewarded with our Panther Bucks for following all of these rules and following our Guidelines for Success of being Respectful, Responsible, and Safe. Panther Bucks can be used at our School Store or turned in for team points. In some classrooms, they can even be used for classroom treasure box.

A restorative approach to conflict or wrongdoing consists of asking 4 key questions:

- 1. What has happened?
- 2. Who has been affected?
- 3. How can we involve everyone who has been affected in finding a way forward?
- 4. How can everyone do things differently in the future?
- * This process is not about punishment but making a student accountable to our school community for being a good citizen.

Why do we care so much about attendance?

Attendance - just how important is it in elementary school? Don't the students have time to make it up? They are so young and have so many years of school left. That's what I was wondering the other day, so I did a little research. I was amazed with what I found. They can get really behind. Here's what I discovered. If students have excellent attendance in kindergarten and 1st grade, their Language Arts scores in 3rd grade are 50 points higher than children who miss 18 days or more per year. While many of us may think missing kindergarten or 1st grade may not count much, it seems to be very important for testing success two and three years later. Again, to my surprise, Math scores in 3rd grade for kids who were present at school are even higher yet. The scores were 76 points better than the students who miss more than 18 days of school per year in kindergarten and 1st grade. When I think about it, it makes sense. Each year is a building block for the next year and it can be hard to catch up with spotty attendance, including tardy days.

Although the specifics may change from one research study to another, the trend is the same.

Attendance is really important even for the very early years of school and can affect later performance. We have to watch closely because sometimes we don't realize just how much instructional time children are missing with absent and tardy days combined. So, how can we as parents help our children be successful in school? Excellent attendance.
