The Florida Department of Education (FDOE) released the 2024 district-level results, and Pinellas County Schools has earned an "A" for the first time in its history.

Another first, every Pinellas County School earned an A, B, or C.

"I am incredibly proud as this designation is the result of the dedication and commitment of our Board and every PCS employee," said Pinellas County School District Superintendent Kevin Hendrick. "The work of every one of our schools is evident, and the excellence of our amazing students continues to elevate because of the work in our classrooms, schools, and district offices. This is a historically great day for our community."

Pinellas County School Board Chairperson Laura Hine added, "This is exceptional news for the families of Pinellas County and is the result of leadership having sustained laser focus on the work at hand - 100% student success." The District's Strategic Plan for 2023-26 set an objective of obtaining a district grade of an A and they earned it in year one.

"Well done and well deserved to my fellow school board members, Mr. Hendrick, the leadership of the district, the leadership of our teachers, staff, students, and families who made this possible with their commitment to our schools and to each other," added Hine.



PCS celebrates Mangrove Bay Middle School opening

Pinellas County Schools, along with the YMCA of Greater St. Petersburg, celebrated the ribbon cutting for Mangrove Bay Middle School on Aug. 8. Mangrove Bay's Health and Wellness Leadership Academy is a mid-county magnet program that offers students in grades 6 through 8 a project-based curriculum, designed to challenge students to think critically and excel academically. The school is connected to the Speer YMCA and the two will share several facilities, including the pool, gymnasium and outdoor track.

Power Up Learning

Schools are relying on technology more and more and educators play a crucial role in teaching these skills. However, teachers often face overwhelming demands, making it challenging to prioritize digital literacy alongside core curriculum. This year Pinellas County Schools will introduce initiatives and recommend resources like Common Sense Education's K–12 Digital Responsibility Curriculum, which offers comprehensive lessons and engaging materials.

Dr. Len Chatman has a unique way of preparing for a new school year.

"I am going hiking and kayaking down the Suwanee River for seven days," Chatman said while attending this year's Elevating and Celebrating Effective Teachers and Teaching (ECET2) conference at the University of South Florida St. Petersburg. "I clear my mind, truly unplug, journal and think about what I want to focus on for the year."

Chatman, a social studies teacher at Northeast High School, transitioned from the military to teaching through Troops to Teachers and PCS's Transition to Teaching program. He says in an effort to truly get to know his students, he doesn't conduct any academic learning in his class the first two weeks of school.

"I spend a lot of time thinking about what my kids are going to feel when they walk in my class the first day," Chatman said.
