Four PCS students spent two weeks in Nagano, Japan this summer as part of Clearwater's Sister Cities student exchange program.

Student Exchange Program sends four to Nagano

Other than their hot, humid summer climates, Nagano, Japan and Clearwater, Florida have very little in common.

"McDonald's doesn't taste like McDonald's, 7-11 is more like a gourmet restaurant and students actually have a cleaning period where they help clean and maintain their school campus," said Thai Cheng, a senior at Countryside High School. "And the most popular Domino's pizza has potatoes and mayo on top."

But none of those things kept Thai from falling in love with Clearwater's sister city when he and three other local exchange students visited Nagano over the summer. The four students lived with host families, went to school with their host brothers and sisters, ate homemade meals and even took part in miniature Japanese language lessons over dinner.

"The program is really a great and unique opportunity because it offered an entirely different viewpoint on traveling," said Jenna Alandary, a junior at Palm Harbor University High School. "I think it really changes you as a person – to travel somewhere without a lot of supervision and to just be completely different from your environment."

The Sister City relationship between Nagano and Clearwater began in 1959 and in 1990, the student exchange program launched. To apply to be a high school exchange student, students must be Clearwater residents, have a 3.5 GPA, write an essay as part of their application as well as attend six orientations prior to the trip date. Similarly, the young ambassador's program, which began in 2001, provides middle school students with a cultural immersion experience in the city of Nagano.

Both groups of students presented on their trip at the August 15 Clearwater City Council meeting. "I am so happy this program has existed in Clearwater for Art Exhibition - District Administration Building

• Sept. 26 - p.m. - North County College & Career Fair - Countryside High School so many years," said Clearwater Mayor Bruce Rector. "You're not just representing Clearwater; you are representing Florida and our country."

Seminole Middle night foreman earns degree at 37

Heidi Hayden had tried to return to school before.

Nine years ago, Hayden, the recently promoted night foreman at Seminole Middle School, tried to return to get her General Education Diploma (GED) but the timing wasn't right.

"I wasn't motivated enough and just stopped going," said Hayden, who recently walked across the stage in the Countywide Graduation ceremony at St. Petersburg High School. "But I went back, and I did it. You have to stop coming up with excuses and just do it."

Hayden, who would have graduated from East Forsyth High School in North Carolina in 2005, is mom to seventh and 12th -grade daughters and has worked at Seminole Middle for almost six years. She started as a plant operator, and, last July, when the night foreman position became available, she knew she wanted it.

But she had to get her degree first.
