

She thinks the students are fantastic. Kathy started to work in the district 16 years ago. She has worked for adult education for 13 years. She thinks her job is amazing, and she loves it. She talked about important things for her job. She doesn't just say hello to students in the morning. She tries to be nice and happy when the students come in. She wants them to feel like they are welcomed at the school and



wants them to be happy here, so they want to stay to learn English. She doesn't really have any big challenges in her job except she said she can only speak one language. She wishes she could speak other languages and mentioned Vietnamese and Spanish so she could communicate more with everybody. She said she took French in high school, but nobody speaks French, so she forgot. Now she wishes she had taken Spanish. Kathy thinks this school looks like an international school because most of the students are from other countries. She loves the fact that everybody's different and everybody has different stories about where they come from. When she reads some of the stories students write, she is just amazed at what people have gone through in their countries and just to get here. She worries about the students because of what's happening now with some people getting deported. That makes her sad and scared for the students, but she is never afraid of the students, never, never. She talked about students' names, and how some are difficult for Americans to say correctly. She tries hard to make sure she gets their names right because she doesn't want to call somebody by the wrong name. She wants everybody to feel really comfortable when they come here because she knows it might be scary for them. One very important thing for her is that she wants to see the students succeed with everything they want to do, learn English, get a diploma, get a great job, and just be happy and safe too." 

Opportunities for Pinellas County families to get FREE groceries at drive-through mobile sites.

The Juvenile Welfare Board (JWB) and the St.
Petersburg Free Clinic (SPFC) have partnered to
design a program to address food insecurity and
mitigate the financial strain on residents facing high
costs of living. Each household will receive
approximately 50 pounds of food, including fresh
produce, proteins, dairy, and shelf-stable essentials.
All Pinellas County residents who demonstrate need
qualify. While specific requirements may vary,
residents are generally advised to bring photo
identification and proof of residency like a utility bill
with a current address.

Distribution events are set for Thursday, November 20<sup>th</sup>, 2025, and Thursday, December 18<sup>th</sup>, 2025.

We will let you know as soon as we learn of the upcoming distribution sites and times.

What Do I Need to Bring? If possible...


No photo ID or proof of residence is needed.
